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Dear Colleagues,

Welcome to summer! I hope everyone is having the chance to enjoy the warm weather and spend time with family and friends.

The OSA Officers, Board of Directors, and staff have been working hard through the spring and into the summer advocating for our specialty and planning our upcoming Annual Meeting.

It has been a busy year at the Statehouse advocating for physician led anesthesia care for all Ohioans. House Bill 318, introduced by Representatives Phil Plummer (R-Dayton) and DJ Swearingin (R-Huron), which would revise the law governing Certified Anesthesiologists Assistants (CAAs), passed out of the House Health Committee shortly before the Legislature recessed in June. It will now move to the Rules Committee for consideration for a full House vote, The bill would then go to the Senate for hearings. HB 318 seeks to remove the administrative tasks surrounding “enhanced supervision” for CAAs within their first 4 years of practice and to permit a protocol for CAAs to order medications in the perioperative period, while maintaining anesthesiologist supervision requirement. The Ohio State Association of Nurse Anesthetists oppose the bill. OSA and OSMA are neutral on HB 318, the same position taken on HB 197.

Also, thank you to those of you who replied to our call for nominations to several Ad-hoc OSA Committees. We will be contacting individuals this summer regarding ad-hoc committee assignments. We received feedback about having additional ad-hoc OSA committees, we value all the feedback we receive and will be discussing it at the upcoming OSA Fall Board meeting!

Please mark your calendar for our **83rd Annual Meeting**, which will be held in **Columbus Ohio at the Hilton Easton, September 17-18, 2022**. Our meeting co-directors, Drs. Michael Lyaker & David Stahl, have an outstanding program planned including ample CME opportunities, including MOCA patient safety credits, and the ability to network with colleagues across the state. Remember that OSA annual meeting attendance is a member benefit as long as you pre-register. Please go to www.osainc.org for more information.

Statehouse REPORT

August Primary for Statehouse Races

While most of Ohio's primary races were decided in May, the Ohio House of Representatives and the Ohio Senate primary races will be decided in a separate primary election to be held on August 2, 2022. This is a result of the Ohio Reapportionment Board being unable to finalize new district maps. While the Board did submit several maps for consideration, the Ohio Supreme Court found them unconstitutional and ultimately maps for this year only were allowed to be used.

Anesthesiologist Assistants (HB 318) passes House Committee

HB 318, which would revise the law governing Anesthesiologists Assistants (AAs), passed out of the House Health Committee shortly before the Legislature recessed in June. It will now move to the Rules Committee for consideration for a full House vote. The bill would then go to the Senate for hearings. You may recall HB 197, that passed into law in March 2020. HB 197 allowed CRNAs, in limited circumstances, to order drugs under a protocol approved by the supervising physician. HB 318 seeks to establish a similar protocol for AAs, keeping the anesthesiologist supervision requirement. The Ohio State Association of Nurse Anesthetists oppose the bill. OSA and OSMA are neutral on HB 318, the same position taken on HB 197.

Physician Assistants

The Ohio Association of Physician Assistants continue to seek expanded authority to order and administer sedation. While no bill nor amendment has been introduced, we anticipate activity on this issue in the post-election session (November/December).

HB 221 APRN Independent Practice

HB 221, which would allow APRNs to practice independently from physicians, has not had hearings in the last several months. Please note that HB 221 does not include CRNAs.

SB 321 APRNs

SB 321 was introduced in late May and includes language relating to APRNs and not CRNAs. We are working with the bill's sponsor to better understand the goal of the bill.

Session ends December 31, 2022

The two-year General Assembly ends on December 31, 2022, so any bill that has not passed both the House and Senate, dies. The new General Assembly begins in January 2023.

PAs seek scope expansion

The OSA has been working with the Ohio Physicians Assistants Association to better understand what kind of scope expansion they seek, what patient care problem needs solved and what that language might look like. OSA leadership wants to ensure that any expansion is consistent with a current patient need, consistent with the PA training, and continues to be under the supervision of a physician. No legislation has been introduced on this issue yet.

Telemedicine: HB 122

As you may know, during the pandemic, the Ohio Medical Board put a temporary exemption in place on their telemedicine rules, as did the other medical licensure boards. That exemption was set to expire at the end of September. The Medical board extended the exemption until the end of the year. In the meantime, concerns by the greater physician and hospital community were raised that telemedicine was working well for patients, staff and was being safely implemented. HB 122 seeks to extend telemedicine practice in lieu of the medical board rules. Since HB 122 is expected to pass the Senate, the Medical Board extended their rules exemption until the end of March 2022 so there would not be a gap between their rules and HB 122 being effective. As of this writing, the bill is pending in Senate Health Committee and debate continues.

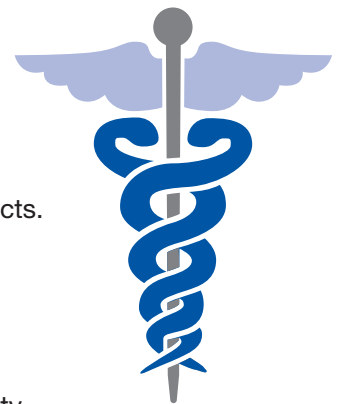

OSA Research Grant

Research is the main foundation for the progress of our specialty and advancing the care of our patients. Therefore, the OSA has decided to take the lead to be among the first state societies to offer and sponsor an annual research grant.

Eligibility:

Active OSA members are eligible, and encouraged to mentor OSA resident members through the process. Grant submission rules.

1. The submission period extends from April 1st till the end of June and the results will be announced at the OSA annual meeting.
2. Grants are to be reviewed by an ad-hoc sub-committee out of the CEAM Committee members appointed by the CEAM Chair.
3. All forms of clinical research including quality improvement projects are welcomed, no case reports.
4. The submitted protocol should have background, hypothesis, methods and statistical analysis.
5. While Institutional IRB approval is not a priori requirement for submission, priority will be given to IRB approved projects.
6. The submitted protocol should be accompanied by department chair approval letter, which states the department endorsement and support for the study. A matching departmental fund would be considered in the grant evaluation.
7. Up to two grants per year; each can be up to a total of 10 thousand dollars as justified by the submitted budget.
8. One third of the amount will be delivered upon acceptance of the grant application; the second third will be delivered upon receipt of the progress report 6-12 month of the initial acceptance.
9. The grant funds will not cover indirect costs such as salary and/or benefits compensation.
10. Final report should be received by the OSA no later than 24 months from the initial grant acceptance date, and the remainder of the grant amount will be delivered upon submission of the final manuscript to a journal for publication.
11. Grant results should be submitted as an abstract at the annual meeting, and when the manuscript is submitted for publication, it should be accompanied by a recognition statement of the grant from this society.

ASA Director's Report

Your ASA continues its tireless fight to advance the practice and secure the future of anesthesiology. Some of the more recent advocacy efforts include:

- Working with other medical organizations to have the National Academy of Medicine (NAM) Action Collaborative on Clinician Well-Being draft document which included the non-consensus “goal” from the advanced practice nursing community directing policymakers “to allow advanced practice providers (e.g., nurse practitioners, midwives) to practice independently” removed from the draft report on health care clinician burn-out.
- Convening a Workforce Summit on June 9 and 10 at ASA's headquarters in Schaumburg, Illinois. The agenda was designed by a multi-stakeholder steering committee led by Past President Mary Dale Peterson. The goal was to explore factors affecting the workforce and to suggest solutions that could serve to balance supply and demand in the near and long term.
- ASA's new Early Career Membership Program will provide young anesthesiologists with key clinical and career resources during the pivotal first three years of practice. Any U.S.-based anesthesiologist who has recently completed training and is within their first three years of practice can take advantage of this program by paying one low price (\$299 or less) for three years of consecutive membership, and they'll receive free ASA member education products and event registrations ordinarily valued at more than \$4,600.
- ANESTHESIOLOGY 2022 registration is now open. Plan on being in New Orleans, October 21 to 25 for an inspiring lineup of speakers, exciting research, industry innovations, and more.
- ASA, along with colleagues at the American College of Emergency Physicians, was an early and active endorser of the bipartisan Lorna Breen Act signed into law on March 18. The law will direct nearly \$140 million over three years to hospitals, medical professional associations, and other health care groups for resiliency training and education for students, residents, and other medical professionals.
- In May, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals granted the government's motion to stay its appeal of the Texas decision while final rulemaking on NSA proceeds. The Texas district court's opinion affirmed that the plain language of the No Surprises Act was not intended to provide the giveaway to insurers that was included in the Interim Final Rule from last September. ASA will await issuance of the Final Rule and will stand ready to proceed with their legal case if the agencies fail to adhere to the district court's order and the plain meaning of the Act.
- ASA held its annual Legislative Conference in Washington, D.C. May 9-11. This meeting, the first in-person one since the pandemic began, was another success. And speaking of advocacy, ASAPAC held its annual Day Of Contributing on June 21, with California and North Carolina leading in amount contributed and the number of contributors, with Rhode Island leading with the highest percentage of members contributing. We'll have to see how the final numbers shake out.

OSA Annual Travel Awards

Up to 2 (two) grants annually for active OSA members who are interested in attending the ASA Legislative Conference in Washington, DC and the ASA spokesperson training workshop.

1. Applicants must be active non-officer OSA members in good standing and endorsed by two other OSA active members.
2. Applicants must attend the OSA annual meeting which precedes the Legislative Conference.
3. Priority will be given to private practice anesthesiologists.
4. Applications must be received at the OSA office between the conclusion of the annual meeting and November 30th of the same year.
5. Applications will be reviewed and the winners selected by the Executive Committee.
6. Results will be announced around mid-January of the following year.
7. The OSA office will register the grant winners for the conference and the spokesperson training workshop., Reimbursement will include only 3 weeks-advanced-purchase coach air travel or mileage per federal rate (whichever is lower), 2 nights lodging at the conference hotel at a cost no higher than the conference rate, as well as reasonably-priced meals and incidentals no greater than \$100 per day.
8. Exceptions to the above conditions will be at the discretion of the OSA president and the Executive Committee.

Resident Component Report

Dear Colleagues,

What an eventful and amazing year 2022 has been! With Omicron hitting us hard at the beginning of the year, and many of our own getting sick, we saw once again the incredible camaraderie and teamwork of our residents. I want to thank everyone for your hard work, flexibility and resiliency. With the COVID numbers decreasing after January, we had the opportunity to attend in person conferences again. Congratulations to all the residents who presented at MARC (Midwest Anesthesia Resident Conference) in St. Louis. It was a blast seeing everyone in person again.

In May, Brandon Beck (delegate for government affairs) and I had the opportunity to attend the ASA legislative conference in Washington. We were amazed by how many residents from Ohio and the country attended the conference. It was an incredible opportunity to learn about advocacy and meet with members of congress to voice our concerns. I want to share with you the main issues that we discussed at the conference.

- The Veterans Affairs VA is proposing new standards to eliminate anesthesiologists from the team-based anesthesia care, so we asked members of congress to sponsor the “Protect Lifesaving Anesthesia Care for Veterans Act”. The VAs proposal of moving to a nurse-only model threatens the safe and high-quality care delivered to our country’s veterans. More than 400 of the VA Anesthesiologists sent notifications through the “Stop the Line” patient safety initiative requesting the proposal be withdrawn and were ignored more than four times. We urged our members of congress to contact VA secretary McDonough to at least reply to these concerns.
- An issue that is very relevant to the residents is the loan interest relief. We asked our members of congress to sponsor the REDI act (Resident Education Deferred Interest) that would allow for interest free deferment on student loans while in residency.
- The Medicare physician payment system is broken, and we asked our members of congress to prevent the 9% cut scheduled for January 1st, 2023. Medicare rates for anesthesia services represent less than a third of commercial insurance payments. Congress has included no inflation adjustments for payments meaning that payments to Anesthesiologists are about half of what they were in 1991 (adjusted for inflation).
- Lastly, the enactment of the “No Surprises Act” protects patients from surprise medical bills. However, this bill also creates a new health care provider payment system that is flawed and favors insurance companies. We urged the members of congress to carefully monitor the implementation of this bill.

Our goal for this summer is to achieve 100% OSAPAC and ASAPAC resident donations. We want every resident in Ohio to be aware of these key issues. We encourage all the residents to learn about advocacy and to attend next year’s ASA legislative conference. I hope I can see all of you in Columbus for the OSA annual conference.

OSA Political Action Committee — Why Belong to OSA PAC?

WHAT IS THE OSA PAC?

The OSA PAC is a political action committee that is maintained as a fund separate from the OSA. It also allows us to educate legislators of the role anesthesiologists play in maintaining the highest of patient safety for the people of Ohio.

MAKING YOUR OSA PAC CONTRIBUTION

Contributions under \$250 will receive the OSA PAC lapel pin, designating you as an official OSA PAC member. Contributions of \$250 or more will result in your name being printed in the next newsletter and circle of distinction PAC lapel pin. 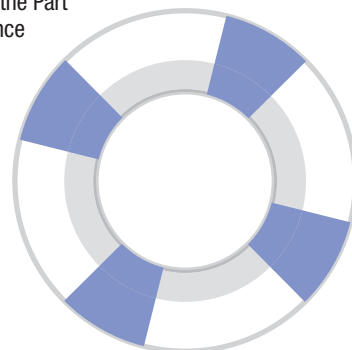
